



Happy Mother's Day

Render to all their due; taxes to whom taxes, customs to whom customs, fear to whom fear, honor to whom honor. (Romans 13:7)

My son, hear the instruction of your father, **and do not forsake the law of your mother**; for they will be a graceful ornament on your head and chains around your neck (Proverbs 1:8-9)

We realize the context of Romans 13 is submission to the government, but verse seven teaches a principle that has much broader application. We are to *"render to all their due."* Who on this earth is due more honor than our mothers?

Our mothers dream of us before we exist. They love us in prospect, hoping that we will bring the joy and blessing that they anticipate. They nurture us before we are born. In our most helpless times, they meet our every need. So much of our confidence, our skills, our faith, and our love we first learn from mother. Paul wrote to Timothy of his genuine faith *"which*

dwelt first in your grandmother Lois and your mother Eunice..." (2 Timothy 1:5). What was true of Timothy is true of so many of us.

In childhood and maturity, the approval of a godly mother brings out our best. She doesn't even need to remind us. We all know something of how much we owe her. Like the children of Proverbs 31, we naturally and happily *"rise up and call her blessed."* No matter our age, few compliments can rival the power of these simple words, "Your mother must be so proud of you!"

Even our memories of a godly mother possess tremendous power. Her words, her ways, her touch, her smile - they warm our hearts and touch our souls. If mother is what God intended, she remains our first expression of God's rich love for us. If mother walks with the Lord, she remains one of God's most powerful and enduring blessings.
