JEOPARDY

Since the television game show Jeopardy is basically a televised trivia game, I thought that I would begin this with a little trivia. I'm old enough to remember that there was a host on the show before Alex Trebek. Art Fleming was the man's name. I remember seeing him on my parents' old black and white television. I also listened to him occasionally toward the end of his career as a broadcaster on KMOX radio in St. Louis.

About the only time I see the program now is when it is on in some waiting room, restaurant, hospital room in which I am visiting, etc. Since I'm not a regular viewer, I missed the show that recently made the news in some areas. It did, however, pop up on something I was reading online. The incident that made the news had to do with a quotation from the Bible. Here's the statement which was read by Mayim Bialik (one of the current hosts): "Matthew 6:9 says, Our Father, which art in heaven, 'This' be thy name."

This question and the reaction that followed did not make the news because one of the contestants set some sort of record for the quickest response in the long history of the show. Neither did the reason have to do with some really "off the wall" response.

The three contestants obviously knew a lot of stuff about a lot of stuff. They would not have been on the show otherwise. In fact, according to what I read, one of them was on a five-game winning streak and ultimately won the game that night. The reason that this made the news is that not one of the three contestants even tried to guess. Not one of them knew that the "this" in that scripture was "hallowed."

I'm thinking the word "jeopardy" is much more than the name of a game show. It is even more than a word to describe certain situations in which we may find ourselves. I'm thinking that this could be one more of many indications that the time may be long past when citizens of the United States could accurately refer to our country as a "Christian nation."

One reason for that opinion should be obvious to those who are paying attention to some of the things which are going on around us. It is becoming more and more acceptable to promote and celebrate what the Bible condemns. That is especially true in the area of morality.

Another reason for that opinion is that it is apparently true that, along with the fact that people do not care what the Bible says, many do not **know** what it says. It only took a very few minutes of "online research" to come up with the following:

- This headline is from a study done by the Pew Research Center in October of 2019 (before Covid had any impact) "In US, Decline of Christianity Continues at Rapid Pace"
- According to other studies I've looked at online, the number of people who report that they attend any sort of religious service (including Buddhist, Hindu Islam, etc.) at least once a week is somewhere around 30 percent. One study reported that the number of people who identify themselves in any way as Christian was as low as 17 percent. Most of the studies I looked at reported that the percentage of people who never attend a religious service is equal to or in some cases greater than the percentage that attend at least once a week.

A study in 2020 conducted by The Barna Group produced the following statistics about citizens of our nation and the frequency of their/our Bible reading:

Daily - 9 percent * Four or more times a week - 3 percent * Once a week - 9 percent * Several times - 10 percent * Once a month - 9 percent * Once a year - 11 percent * Three or four times a year - 8 percent * Never - 34 percent.

There are some serious indications that we would do well to consider the following quote from our nation's second president, John Adams, "Our Constitution was made only for a moral and religious people. It is wholly inadequate to the government of any other."

I am not among those who seek to apply God's promises to the Jews during the time when the Old Testament was being written with how He views the United States today. With that being said, I do believe that an application could be made today concerning this statement from God: My people are destroyed for lack of knowledge; because you have rejected knowledge, I reject you from being a priest to me. And since you have forgotten the law of your God, I will also forget your children (Hosea 4:6).

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ENVISIONING A DIFFERENT FUTURE

The three hundred middle and high school students in the small town of Neodesha, Kansas, filed into a surprise school assembly. They then sat in disbelief upon hearing that a couple with ties to their town had decided to pay college tuition for every Neodesha student for the next twenty-five years. The students were stunned, overjoyed, and tearful.

Neodesha had been hard hit economically, which meant many families worried about how to cover college expenses. The gift was a generational game-changer, and the donors hoped it would immediately impact current families but also incentivize others to move to Neodesha. They envision their generosity igniting new jobs, new vitality - an entirely different future for the town.

God desired His people to be generous by not only tending to their own acute needs but also by envisioning a new future for their struggling neighbors. God's directions were clear: If any of your fellow Israelites become poor and are unable to support themselves among you, help them (Leviticus 25:35). The generosity wasn't only about meeting basic physical needs but also about considering what their future life together as a community would require. Help them, God said, so they can continue to live among you. (v 35).

The deepest forms of giving reimagine a different future. God's immense, creative generosity encourages us toward that day when we'll all live together in wholeness and plenty.
