lawn. Pull the plug, and these inflatables collapse.

The inflatable Christmas is for show. Drive through these neighborhoods in the daylight hours and these same displays usually lay flat and lifeless on the ground. Empty. Deflated.

The inflatable Christmas is temporary. Like most Christmas decorations, the inflatable Christmas is seasonal. Some displays will come down on Christmas Day. Some will be packed away the day after Christmas. Some will remain intact for a week or so through New Year's Day. Most, however, are completely out of sight by mid-January - except for those whose masters choose to leave their lights up all year, but only plug them in around Christmas, but surely even their inflatables will have to be put away when the lawn mower comes out.

The inflatable Christmas can be a reminder of a more serious condition: the inflatable Christian.

The inflatable Christian is full of air. Not much content. Not much on the inside. Not much real conviction and very little substance. No depth. On the surface, they look good. Bright. Cheerful. Exciting. Colorful. However, they are filled by what is light and air.

The inflatable Christian is only about the show. Just look at and admire them. Praise them for what appears to be really nice, but don't look on the inside. Appreciate them from distance, but don't get too close or you may be surprised, disappointed, or discouraged.

The inflatable Christian is temporary. They only appear on special occasions. They are not around during the dark days of winter or the dry days of summer. During those times, they're busy with what the surrounding world says are the important things. However, when the season is right and the message is pleasing, they show up ... dressed up, smiling, and looking good for the occasion.

The real Christmas and the real follower of Christ are not made of plastic and can not be deflated by simply pulling a plug. The original Christmas has meaning and a real Christian is consistent in their commitment in public and in private.

Jesus may have had inflatable Christmas and inflatable Christians in mind when He described the religious people of his day - the inflated religious folks - with terms like, Everything they do is for others to see ... hypocrites ... blind guides ... whitewashed tombs (Matthew 23).

We have a choice of what kind of Christian we will be and what kind of Christmas we will have. Let's enjoy the season to the fullest. Let's remember the true meaning. Let's celebrate the story. Let's share the joy. Even more, let's live the life ... the real life, not the inflated one.

TIMELY RESOLUTION

The unresolved hurt between Simon and Geoffrey had persisted for years, and Simon's attempts to reenter the relationship had been resisted. Upon hearing the news of the death of Geoffrey's mother, Simon traveled "up country" in Kenya to attend her funeral service. Simon reflected on their encounter: "I had no expectations at all in terms of how the whole thing would turn out, [but] after the service, we opened up and had a fruitful talk. We hugged, shared the moment, prayed together, and planned to meet again." If only Simon and Geoffrey had been able to reconcile earlier, so much ongoing pain could have been avoided.

The words of Jesus in Matthew 5:21-26 help to put unresolved relational tensions in perspective. The anger that can lead to such rifts is a serious matter (v 22). Furthermore, getting things in order relationally is a fitting prelude to worshiping God (vv 23-24). The wise words of Jesus to *settle matters quickly with your adversary* (v 25) remind us that the sooner we do what we can to work toward reconciliation the better for all.

Relationships are risky; they demand work - in our families, in the workplace, in educational settings, and among people who share our faith in Christ. But as those who represent Him, the *Prince of Peace* (Isaiah 9:6), may we find ourselves going out of our way to extend our hearts and hands to those with whom we have unresolved conflict.
