TRUE LIGHT

BEGINNING

I'm sure today's title is not a shock as it is only the second day of a new year when this is being [originally] published. It is a time of goal setting for some and reflection for others. I decided to explore the idea of beginnings in the Bible. I was surprised by the number of times the words "begin" or "beginning" were used in total. Of course, the most obvious was Genesis 1:1 where we read, *In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth*. It was really this thought that got my brain going. It all begins with God, so how else is that represented throughout the Bible?

As I looked, I found many beginnings. There are beginnings of kingdoms as early as Genesis 10:10. Progressions are started with statements such as beginning with the eldest (Genesis 44:12) and beginning with the older

ones (John 8:9). There are many references to God and Jesus as having been from the beginning.

There are two other "beginning" passages I want us to consider today where what I want us to see is actually the end. In Luke 24, the resurrected Christ is walking on the road to Emmaus with two disciples who, for whatever reason, were kept from recognizing Him. After discussing with them the events of His death and reports of His resurrection, Luke records, *And beginning with Moses and all the Prophets, he interpreted to them in all the Scriptures the things concerning himself* (verse 27).

The second passage I want to consider is found in Acts 8. Here we read of Philip overtaking the chariot where an Ethiopian eunuch was reading from Isaiah. In verse 35 we read, *Then Philip opened his mouth, and beginning with this Scripture he told him the good news about Jesus.*

The point I want to make with these two passages is simple. It doesn't matter where you begin, it all comes back to and ends with Jesus. That is why in Revelation, there is rejoicing and worship in heaven when the Lamb is able to open the scroll (Rev. 5:5) and why it's portrayed as victorious when He appears as the rider on the white horse (Rev. 19).

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God (John 1:1). Yes, He was in the beginning ... but everything also leads back to Him in the end.

GENUINE HOPE

In the early 1960s, the US was filled with anticipation of a bright future. Youthful President John F. Kennedy had introduced the New Frontier, the Peace Corps, and the task of reaching the moon. A thriving economy caused many people to expect the future to simply "let the good times roll." Then the war in Vietnam escalated, national unrest unfolded, Kennedy was assassinated, and the accepted norms of that previously optimistic society were dismantled. Optimism simply wasn't enough, and in its wake, disillusionment prevailed.

Then, in 1967, theologian Jurgen Moltmann's *A Theology of Hope* pointed to a clearer vision. This path wasn't the way of optimism but the way of hope. The two aren't the same thing. Moltmann affirmed that optimism is based on the circumstances of the moment, but hope is rooted in God's faithfulness - regardless of our situation.

What's the source of this hope? Peter wrote, *Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! In his great mercy he has given us new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead* (1 Peter 1:3). Our faithful God has conquered death through His Son, Jesus! The reality of this greatest of all victories lifts us beyond mere optimism to a strong, robust hope - every day and in every circumstance.

HIDING FROM GOD

I squeezed my eyes shut and started counting aloud. My fellow third-grade classmates tore out of the room to find a place to hide. After scouring every cabinet, trunk, and closet for what felt like hours, I still couldn't find one of my friends. I felt ridiculous when she finally jumped out from behind a lacey, potted fern hanging from the ceiling. Only her head had been eclipsed by the plant - the rest of her body had been in plain sight the entire time!

Since God is all-knowing, when Adam and Eve "hid from" Him (Genesis 3:8) in the garden of Eden, they were always in "plain sight." But they weren't playing any childhood games; they were experiencing the sudden awareness - and shame - of their wrongdoing, haven eaten from the tree God told them not to eat from.

Adam and Eve turned from God and His loving provision when they disobeyed His instructions. Instead of withdrawing from them in anger, however, He sought them out, asking, *Where are you?* (v. 9). It's not that He didn't know where they were, but He wanted them to know his compassionate concern for them.

I couldn't see my friend hiding, but God always sees us and knows us - to Him we're always in plain sight. Just as He pursued Adam and Eve, Jesus sought us out while we were *still sinners* dying on the cross to demonstrate His love for us (Romans 5:8). We no longer need to hide.
