THE SIGNIFICANCE OF THE NAME "CHRISTIAN"

The name "Christian" carries profound significance, rooted in the early history of the church, known as 'the Way" or "the Faith." Derived from the Greek word "Christianos," it means "follower of Christ." The term "Christian" was first used in Antioch (Acts 11:26); it was what those outside of Christ called those baptized into Christ, possibly in a blasphemous way (James 2:7). Thus, the name "Christian" signifies a personal choice to embrace Christ in baptism (Galatians 3:27) and to live faithfully until death (Rev. 2:10) in accordance with the teaching exemplified by Jesus and scripture. It is not merely a label; it represents a lifestyle dedicated to service, humility, and faith. Therefore, the name "Christian" is not just an identifier; it symbolizes profound devotion and a call to lead a spiritual life. Many individuals adopt the name "Christian" without genuinely following Jesus' teaching and scripture (James 1:22). These individuals may simply misunderstand what the name fundamentally signifies from a biblical perspective. Many today assert that reciting a personal prayer (e.g., the sinner's prayer) automatically makes someone a Christian. However, this view is not accurate.

Many people may lead a "Christian" life, or what we will refer to as a good moral life, but that does not necessarily make them a Christian (Acts 11:14). They may even lead a religious life (Acts 17:22), but will that genuinely save an individual? The simple answer is no. One must obey all the teachings in the New Testament to be called a "Christian;" they must not only have a basic belief in Jesus as their Lord and Savior, but they must also follow all the teachings of the New Testament to please God and to be a "follower of Christ" (Hebrews 11:6).

As we go out to teach the gospel in our community, as commanded by our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, baptizing them in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to observe all things (Matthew 28:19-20), let us always remember that the power to save and the honor or bearing the name "Christian" comes solely from the power of God (Romans 1:16).

The Lord Jesus Christ be with you all.

God does much of His work on earth through "volunteers" like you and me. Although we're part of a community that's much bigger than any contribution we may make, we can help it grow by working together to share His love with the world.

WHO KNOWS?

According to Chinese legend, when Sai Weng lost one of his prized horses, his neighbor expressed sorrow for the loss. But Sai Weng was unconcerned. He said, "Who knows if it may be a good thing for me?" Surprisingly, the lost horse returned home with another horse. As the neighbor congratulated him, Sai Weng said, "Who knows if it may be a bad thing for me?" As it turned out, his son broke his leg when he rode on the new horse. This seemed like a misfortune, until the army arrived at the village to recruit all able-bodied men to fight in the war. Because of the son's injury, he wasn't recruited, which ultimately could have spared him from death.

This is the story behind the Chinese proverb which teaches that a difficulty can be a blessing in disguise and vice versa. This ancient wisdom has a close parallel in Ecclesiastes 6:12, where the author observes: Who knows what is good for a person in life? Indeed, none of know what the future holds. An adversity might have positive benefits, and prosperity might have ill effects.

Each day offers new opportunities, joys, struggles, and suffering. As God's beloved children, we can rest in His sovereignty and trust Him through the good and bad times alike. God has made the one as well as the other (7:14). He's with us in all the events in our lives and promises His loving care. Poh Fang Chia
